

What are the handwashing guidelines for healthcare workers and visitors in my home?

- All healthcare workers must wash their hands with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand rub (like hand sanitizer) when entering or leaving a patient's home. Visitors are strongly encouraged to do the same.
- All healthcare workers must wash their hands with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub immediately before any contact with a patient.
- All healthcare workers must clean their hands before and after wearing gloves.

What should I do if I don't see healthcare workers following these guidelines?

If you do not see members of your healthcare team wash their hands or use an alcohol-based hand rub, **it is OK to ask** them to wash their hands. Asking them to clean their hands can help reduce the spread of infections, keeping you and your loved ones safe.

What handwashing guidelines should I follow?

- Patients should wash their hands frequently with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub.
- If your hands look dirty, wash them for at least 15 seconds using soap and water (instead of hand sanitizer).
